




Team Identity and Vision iSomos los indalos!

Academics

- You will be taking two primary course modules: Language and Culture
 - These two classes will meet daily for 75 minutes each.
 - You will be assessed and received a grade for your overall IUHPFL coursework.
- Twice a week: Community Engagement module
 - Designed to link our class work with the excursions and cultural activities we do outside of class.
 - Prepare for our excursions and activities and debrief after they occur
- You MUST bring your course books with you to Spain!



Afternoon Activities

- After class each day, we'll do some sort of afternoon activity
 - Sports
 - Working on program site magazine or farewell show
 - Community or cultural engagement activity, such as
 - Centro de Interpretación Patrimonial
 - Civil War Shelters
- It is possible that some "afternoon activities" will occur at other times (e.g., if a local site we want to visit is only open in the morning)
- Flexibility in study abroad is key!

Free Time and Curfew

- Our afternoon activities will end around 4pm.
- You will then have free time from 4pm until curfew to explore the city in groups of three or more program participants.
 - Why groups of three?
- Our curfew is 8pm.
 - At curfew, you MUST be back under the supervision of your host family.
 - This doesn't mean you have to be home! You just have to be <u>with</u> your host family.



Program site magazine and Farewell Show



- Program magazine: a scrapbook-style souvenir that each student will contribute to during the program
 - Printed and bound at the end of the program
 - One copy to each student and to each host family
 - Student-led
 - Poems, drawings, recipes, memories, sayings, puzzles
- Farewell show: Variety-style show put on by students at the end of the program to celebrate achievements, thank host families and onsite staff
 - Student-led
 - Features skits, dance, musical numbers, poems or readings
 - Each student participates in some way
- Start thinking about how you might want to contribute!!



Weekends Saturday-Sunday

- Weekends are time to be with your host family.
- What weekends look like differs from family to family/student to student <u>and</u> that's OK.
 - Hikes, mini excursions
 - Time with extended family or friends
 - Time around the house, games, movies
- The goal is to enjoy, soak in as much as you can, be a part of the family and do what they do

Host Family: Tips for Successful Host Family Experience

- Be aware of family habits and routines; when you're not sure about something—ask!
 - Try to adapt and be part of the family; offer to help with chores or dinner
- Pay attention to your use of home resources (e.g., water, electricity), ask about norms for showering, lights, fans/AC, blinds so that you can follow!
- Be open to new practices and customs AND be willing to share about your customs!
- Ask, ask, ask
- Talk, talk, talk
- Be thoughtful and present; join the family in what they do; express gratitude
- Communicate your needs

Host Family: What if things aren't going great?

- Give yourself and your family some time to adapt!
 - But talk with us right away with any concerns or questions
- We can't help you if we don't know!
- Grounds for a host family change:
 - Physical health/well-being
 - Incompatibility of personalities
 - Host family's lack of time
 - Failure of family to abide by Host Family Guidelines and/or the Honor Code
 - Inappropriate behavior of a host family member towards the student and vice versa.

Travel Information



Travel plan/Departure Day

- Mónica, Alicia, and Nick will be traveling with students to Spain
- Departure date:
 - Wednesday June 11th
 - REMEMBER that Indianapolis is on **Eastern Time!**
 - We must arrive to the airport 3 hours before departure.
 - Wear your IUHPFL t-shirt
- Arrival at Indianapolis Airport:
 - We will meet near the American Airlines check-in counters.
 - When all students are accounted for, we will begin the check-in process.
 - Check-in can be a chaotic process!
 - When everyone is checked in, we will take a group picture (i.e., students and family) before heading to security.
 - We will go through **security** together.
- Be sure you have your passport For the flights
 - Bring entertainment (e.g., cards, books, crossword puzzles, snacks/treats, MP3 player, etc.) ¡En español, CLARO!
- Parents: Please join our Remind group. This will solely be used for one-way (IUHPFL to parent) travel updates (e.g., in cases of flight delays, etc.)

Departure Day Do's and Don'ts

Do...

- Try and rest the night before (we know it is difficult when you are nervous).
- Weigh your suitcase before leaving home.
 - You don't want to have to repack at the American counter!
- Bring snacks to the airport. Food at the airport is more expensive and you will want to save money for Spain.

Departure Day Do's and Don'ts

Don't...

- Wait until the last minute to pack!
- Forget to check power cords, adaptors and medication before leaving!
- Leave any liquids over 3oz in your carry-on. They will have to be thrown away during security!

Departure Day What to have on hand...



Passport, passport!



Flight information / boarding passes (students will be responsible for theirs after check-in).



Any medication you (might) need while at the airport or on the plane.



Eye-glasses or additional contact lenses in case you don't want to wear contacts on the plane.



Make sure you have **EUROS** in hand before you come to the airport.

Most banks can order **EUROS**, but it can take a few days for them to arrive.



Bring a <u>backpack</u> and (if desired) a collapsible duffle bag for any new purchases.

Travel Plan/Departure Day

- We arrive to Madrid
- We will **bus** to Almería from Madrid, which is a **6-hour** trip.
 - We will make a short stop so that students can use the restroom and have a light meal (e.g., bocadillo de tortilla de patatas, pechuga de pollo, jamón con queso).
 - It is very important students have EUROS for buying some food.
- Please follow the flights on Google
 - You can google search the status of all flights!

Alicia will send a message on Remind app when we have arrived in Almería

A note about return travel

- We are currently scheduled to return to the Indianapolis airport on July 15th at 6:43PM (Eastern Time).
 - Flight times may change! Please check.
 - A parent or guardian must be at the airport to pick up their child.
 - If alternate arrangements need to be made (e.g., carpooling), please let the IUHPFL office know via email (<u>iuhpfl@iu.edu</u>)

A note about return travel

- If you are not returning on the group flight, then the IUHPFL office has already approved your travel deviation; they will share those details with us.
 - Unless otherwise approved, a parent/guardian will need to pick up the student at our residence in Madrid on the last night of the program after program activities have ended.
- We (the instructors) will reach out via email about 1 1.5
 weeks prior to the end of the program to confirm plans for this
 "hand-off" (e.g., time, location, contact info, etc.).

Travel, preparation and packing

Preparation and packing

Almería can be hot, hot and hot (it is very sunny, 100 °F/ 38°C)

- For the hot weather...
 - Short sleeve shirts, shorts or lighter weight pants
 - Cap or hat / sunscreen to apply throughout the day
- One dress outfit (for the Farewell Show!).
- Athletic clothes (for sports and outdoor activities)
 - Please bring appropriate shoes/clothes for walking long distances (e.g., to the
 excursions, the beach, and walking in the city)
- Bathing suit and bathing cap
- Lunch box and ice packs for daily packed lunch
- Important! Spaniards don't dress as casually as Americans, so you don't want to bring many yoga pants or sweatpants to wear outside of the house!



Other things to pack

- Sunscreen/sunblock, insect repellent, water bottle
 - 50 SPF or higher
- Allergy medication (if applicable)
- Contact lenses/glasses; bring extras and prescription
- Brands of make-up, lotion or hygiene products you prefer
- Any and all medications you will need (over-the-counter and prescriptions) for the 5 weeks
 - Bring copy of prescriptions, know generic names
- Digital camera and MP3 player with music in Spanish
 - No other electronics (this includes smart watches!)
- Adaptors and convertors
- Feminine hygiene products
- Alarm clock
- A small gift for the family is recommended

Preparation and packing

- You are permitted one checked bag, one carry-on, and one personal item (e.g., purse or small book bag)
 - You are in charge of all of your luggage, so only pack what you can manage yourself!
 - Check airline regulations for size and weight guidelines, other restrictions
- There is a packing list in the site-specific section of your handbook.
- We know it's hard but try to pack light. You will be able to do laundry weekly, so you do not need 5 weeks worth of clothes.

Money, Safety, Communication

Money

- Bring some **EUROS** (e.g., 20-50 euros) with you!
- Debit/Credit cards in student's name (Visa/Mastercard)
 - No Discover or American Express
 - No travelers checks
- Call your bank and let them know where, when and how long you
 will be traveling (this also includes within the United States).
- Take maximum amount of money out at a time from ATMs to avoid excessive fees, but do not keep all of it with you at the same time.
 - Charles Schwab refunds ATM fees!
- BUDGET! (know if you can or cannot obtain more money during the program)
- Cash is often needed in shops or for smaller purchases
- No traveler's check
- Prices in case of emergencies: ER 150 euros, Doctor's appointment – 75-125 euros.
 - Keep all receipts

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Money

- \$ What students would need money for:
- Food during international travel
- Lunch/snacks upon arrival in host country (bus from airport to host city)
- Personal expenses (products, snacks)
- Free time and optional activities
- Purchases on excursions (souvenirs, snacks)
- one lunch in Madrid that you will cover on your own



- Every student will receive a program phone with a local number, so that instructors or host family can get ahold of you and vice versa
- It will come prepaid with a certain amount of money on it, that should be sufficient for the entire program if used for program purposes
- If you use your phone more than needed, you may need to add minutes to your phone
 - Your phone MUST always have minutes on it; if you need help adding minutes, talk to one of us!



- Students will keep their personal smart phones <u>locked</u> in magnetic pouches in their possession.
- Generally, they should leave these at their host family's home.
- Students will have an hour of internet time per week;
 this will be taken on their own smart phones at our school on the wifi.
- Students: Unless you have an international roaming plan and want to use it, you will want to leave your phone on airplane mode during the entire trip, turning off roaming and only using wifi

- Students will be able to write emails, texts during this time
 - You may wish to download a wifibased text app (e.g., Whataspp) so that your student can text you during this time using wifi
- Written posts/updates on social media are also fine!
 - No creating/listening to non-Spanish content, so this is not a time for scrolling TikTok, etc.

- Internet time will be during our school day, 1-2 days per week.
 - The schedule/timing might change based on what we're doing that day/week.
 - There is no guarantee that your child will be online at a specific time!
 - The assumption with this time is that most communication will be **asynchronous**, sending you written updates of how and what they are doing that you might read a bit after they are sent.
 - If your student happens to capture you at a time you're available and you are able to text back and forth, great! But that shouldn't be the expectation.



- Students will not be calling home (or receiving calls from you), except in cases of emergency/necessity
- Parents, when you have a question or need to communicate something to your child, contact the IUHPFL office first.
 - We are in regular contact with them; they will let us know if/when something is needed and how to respond.
 - They will put us (instructor-parent or student-parent) in direct contact when needed.
- Follow our activities on the blog We know it's not the same, but it can help!

One final note about phones

- Students will have access to their own smart phones while we are out and about in Madrid. We will ask that they stay off and stowed except if needed; they'll be locked up again once we're back at the dorm.
 - Something to talk about in terms of need for limited international plan or not.

How to follow the students adventure abroad?

- Family, friends and fans (e.g., teachers, mentors, coaches, etc.) can follow the students adventures in Spain through the Blog.
- Nick will update the Blog at least 2 times every week!
 - What to expect uploaded:
 - Travel Updates
 - Photos of outings, classes, and special events
 - Videos

- Rule of three!




Language Commitment
