
What We Expect from Students



Finances

Money

- Get Euros from your bank BEFORE leaving
 - Always have some euros for emergencies
- No traveler's checks
- No money needed to get to school
- Lunch at school & breakfast/dinner at host family home.
- Money for souvenirs, extra travel (nonprogram), snacks
- 1 Euro = \$1.14 U.S. Dollars

Finances - What to Bring

- An ATM/debit card (preferably Visa) that parents can access from the US (to add money to, etc.).
 - Request card to bank with enough time for delivery and use it in the US, before travelling
 - Call your U.S. bank and let them know the card will be used abroad
 - Check fees with your bank beforehand
 - Must be in student's name
 - Withdraw maximum to avoid fees.
 - Trying to withdraw more than your maximum results in a rejection. Try again at a lower amount.

Finances - What to Bring

Cash

- For the very first days (≈100€)
- For optional activities
- For snacks/drinks
- ¡¡¡REBAJAS!!! (Nationwide retail sale beginning July 1st)
- Many banks will provide Euros if you order it at least 2 weeks before departure.

Managing Your Finances



Many places prefer cash over credit/debit cards for small purchases.

American Express **not accepted** in many places.

Withdraw enough cash for several days, but do not carry it all at once.

Always have some cash on you (≈15€)



Know your pin number by the NUMBERS and not by letters (there are usually no letters on keypads)

Spending Money

W W	An ice cream	1 scoop = 2,00€ (\$2.15)
	A coffee and a pastry	Around 5,00€ (\$5.40)
	A postcard and stamp to be sent to the US	Stamp 0,64€, post card = 3,00€ (total: \$3.25)

If a student runs out of money...

- Transfer more money into their account so that they can access it with his/her debit card.
- Send money via Western Union.
 - The name on the money order needs to match the student's name exactly as it appears on their passport.
- If the student is carrying a credit card, they have the option to use it to withdraw cash (this costs extra)
- IUHPFL staff is not permitted to lend students money
- This is part of the new experience: You need to learn how to handle your budget responsibly

Communication with Host Families and Cultural Shock

Communication with host families

- Spend as much time as possible with them!!
- You have to speak up.
 - Be honest without being rude
- Don't ask "do you need help?", just do it! (with helping)
- Try not to make assumptions, always ask for clarification.
- Discussion is not always an argument
 - Spaniards love talking about politics, religion, etc. Be prepared.
 - Discussions in Spanish can sound like arguments (tone, volume, etc.)
- Personal space is different abroad.
 - People get close.
- Bring something for your host family
 - Something that represents where you're from

Mindfulness

Short showers Power/water cost Limited significantly more in Spain than they do in resources the US. Lights/fans/electronics off when not in use Expected to clean up after yourselves, do your own laundry, etc. Not a hotel Keep your bedroom Be respectful of clean and the door families. open.

U.S. vs. Spain

Personal Space & Communication

- Americans tend to be more reserved and indirect.
- Spaniards are generally more open and direct.

Greetings

- Man + Man: Usually a handshake; close
 friends may exchange two kisses.
- Woman + Woman: Two kisses on the cheek (with a kissing sound).
- Woman + Man: Two kisses on the cheek.
- Man + Man: Two kisses may occur depending on the relationship.

Smoking

- Smoking is still common.
- However, there is a nationwide ban on smoking indoors in public places.

Meals and Schedules

- Small breakfasts.
- Large, late lunch (around 1:00–2:00 p.m.).
- Small, late dinner (around 8:00–10:00 p.m.).

Important Reminders

- A lot of improvisation happens during excursions—be flexible!
- Eat more frequently but in smaller portions.
- Carry tissues (Kleenex) and a bottle of water.
- Most businesses are closed on Sundays.
- Spaniards are often late—but this does not apply to you for program activities!

Culture shock

Stages most people go through in adjusting to a new culture



Fun: The excitement and adventure of experiencing new people, things, and opportunities.



Flight: Disorientation brings the urge to avoid everything and everyone that is different.



Fight: The temptation to judge people and things that are different as bad or foolish.



Fit: Creative interaction with the new culture that includes a willingness to understand and embrace.



*Reverse culture shock

The First 72 Hours

- Exhaustion from travel (long flight, long bus ride)
- Jet Lag
- Different family
- Different friends
- Different instructors
- Different city
- Different language
- New home
- Imagine just ONE of these things by itself. The first 72 hours might be challenging.
- Plan to do something to help you relax: music, journaling, taking a walk, talking to host family.
- Be patient!

Culture Shock: How to Handle It

You're not alone

All international students go through this. Your experience is valid and shared.

Focus on what you can control

Don't invest major energy in minor problems.

Face challenges directly

Avoiding things can increase stress. Tackle major issues head-on.

Stay active and laugh

Physical activity and a sense of humor can make a big difference.

Build your support system

Ask for help and connect with others in your new environment.

Write it out

Journaling is a healthy way to process your thoughts and emotions.

Remember that we are a group

Communicate	Communicate with Care Be patient, understanding, and sensitive to each other's feelings and challenges.
Support	Support One Another Encourage your groupmates to speak Spanish and explore the local culture. Remember: We are all learners!
Ве	Be an Active Participant Engage fully in group work, your collaboration matters.

Getting to know one another

Passport to Oviedo

- 1. Create "Passports": Each student receives a half-sheet paper "passport" with 4 prompts:
 - a) My dream destination (besides Oviedo):
 - b) A song I've been listening to on repeat:
 - c) One thing I'm nervous or excited about for this trip:
 - d) One Spanish phrase or word that I love:
- 2. **Speed Sharing:** Students walk around the room and "stamp" their passport by sharing answers with 4-6 classmates (they can draw a star or write the person's name on each other's passport).

3. Debrief

 Invite volunteers to share something interesting they learned about a classmate.

4. Answer:

- a) What did you notice we all have in common?
- What surprised you?"

Oviedo Survival Cards
